RESIDENTIAL **Market Overview**

House price growth has seen regional impacts in this month's report, with Southern England set to see above-average price falls and other areas not seeing price falls at all; yet UK prices are still on track to be up to 5% lower over 2023, according to recent research by Zoopla. Similarly, higher mortgage rates have also reduced demand by 18% in the last two months, pushing us further into a 'buyers market'.


